## Sermon Notes: 'You Shall Know the Truth and the Truth Will Set You Free'

Text: John 8:31-32

"Then Jesus said to the Jews who believed in Him, 'If you abide in My word, you are truly My disciples; and you shall know the truth, and the truth shall set you free.'"

- 1 The liberating power of truth
- Truth is not just information; it is transformative (John 14:6).
- Psalm 119:45 "I will walk about in freedom, for I have sought out your precepts."
- 2 Corinthians 3:17 "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."
- 2 The rejection of truth is not intellectual but moral
- Rejection of truth is resistance of the heart.
- Romans 1:18 "For the wrath of God is revealed... who suppress the truth."
- Romans 1:21 "Although they knew God... their foolish hearts were darkened."
- 3 The example of the Pharisees
- John 5:39-40 "You study the Scriptures... yet you refuse to come to me."
- John 8:43-44 "Why do you not understand what I say? It is because you cannot bear to hear my word."
- 4 Truth requires submission and humility
- James 4:6 "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble."
- Hebrews 3:15 "Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts..."
- 5 Freedom comes to those who receive and walk in truth

- John 3:19-20 "Light has come... but people loved darkness instead of light."
